

Bathgate Summit on Climate Action

Boghall Parish Church Hall 3rd September 2024

Introduction

The Bathgate Summit was intended to bring together interested organisations and residents in Bathgate to discuss local climate issues and ideas and decide on what priority actions to take forward. Invitations were sent to a wide range of local groups, and residents were invited through social media.

The general consensus on the night from the small audience who participated was that Community Transport (81%) was the top area for action. Followed by Climate Education focusing on Green Space (71%), followed by Community Energy (53%).

Twenty-three people attended the event, including 7 from WLCAN Hub. Eight were workers of relevant organisations (at least 2 also Bathgate residents); 8 were volunteers for local organisations and also residents.



As part of the Climate Ready South East Scotland (CRSES) project, led by SNIFFER (a leading climate-related charity), we also promoted and engaged the audience in climate adaptation aspects. Individuals were encouraged to fill in and submit their personal stories of climate change. Stories that have been uploaded so far can be viewed on the map here:


Key Outputs from the Evening


The evening began with an introduction from Cllr Pauline Stafford (Bathgate), and voluntary director of WLCAN Hub, followed by a presentation from Neil Barnes, Senior Development Worker (WLCANH), setting the scene with climate data from a variety of sources on West Lothian. During this presentation there were some warm-up polls conducted through SLIDO, which was used throughout the evening for live electronic voting. Attendees could see the votes being cast on two large screens in the hall. The SLIDO system was supported by local contractor Sharon Campbell of SC Events.


Group Activities


The attendees then divided into two tables to discuss Climate Action issues and ideas for Bathgate, moving through individual responses to collective ones as agreed by consensus in both groups.



The issues and ideas formulated, discussed and agreed are given below via SLIDO.










Following this there was a short tour of the Artlink Project Garden given by Patrick O'Growney and Jackie Mulcahy.



Upon returning to their tables, the groups then reviewed all of the issues and ideas that had been recorded and agreed in order to come to a consensus of the top 3 for their group, giving 6 priorities from the two groups.

Each group had an assigned Group Leader/Scribe, putting notes directly into the SLIDO app interface.






Issues 4 and 5 were very similar and so were combined to give 5 options for the final poll which all voted on individually.

Priority Lead Agencies

The attendees were then asked to name some organisations that could help progress the top 3 priority issues voted for:

Priority 1: Community Transport

- 1.Local Planning Committee
- 2. Bathgate CDT
- 3. Bathgate Together

Priority 2: Climate Education Focussing on Green Spaces

1. WLCAN Hub



Priority 3: Community Energy

No decision was reached but the emerging alliance between the CAN Hubs and Community Energy Scotland was proposed as a possible option.

Other Outputs and Feedback

A breakdown of the climate story outputs and event evaluation feedback is given in **Appendix 2**.

The event was rounded off by Cllr Harry Cartmill (Bathgate), voluntary director of WLCAN Hub, expressing thanks to the church for its superb hospitality, the Artlink Project workers and all those who helped on the night, whilst emphasising the importance of climate change as the no.1 issue humanity faces and welcoming any action suggestions put forward on the night.

Next Steps & Recommendations

- WLCAN Hub to analyse the findings and feedback received, and decide next key steps, timescales, etc, with the Bathgate members in our network.
- Distribute the report to attendees and stakeholders, including those who could not attend.
- Agree a date with the proposed priority leads and others for a follow-up meeting(s) having had sufficient time to digest the report.
- As this was a tiny sample of the Bathgate catchment population, the event, or other types of survey, may have to be repeated to increase participation levels and build on other local and regional engagement work, including the council's recent Citizens' Panel survey on climate, Local Place Plan consultations and more.
- This successful engagement and e-survey approach should be replicated and refined for similar climate engagement events across our region, as planned in the WLCAN Hub calendar, and in tandem with complementary and bespoke training options on offer.



Appendix 1: Additional Points Raised

Some supplementary notes were taken regarding points raised during discussions and are summarised below:

- Transport cars parked outside schools. Engines should be switched off.
- Public transport is lacking.
- Lack of safe cycling & walking routes.
- Flooding a growing problem and severe flooding 2 years ago.
- Fast pace of life a cultural challenge.
- Losing green spaces.
- Increasing industrial zones, e.g. warehousing, battery storage farms, etc.
- We need a more self-sustainable community to reduce commuting to the two big cities.
- More community energy systems (solar, minewater heat, etc) and to lower people's bills.
- Reducing red tape to empower local communities.
- Housing/domestic carbon emissions and longer lives means more emissions. More households means more consumption.
- More vertical, high-density living and colocation of mixed-use accommodation.
- Engage young people more Eco Schools.
- Collaborate with local health & well-being projects.
- General and localised climate action education, spreading good news and positive stories.
- Promotion & enhancement of local skills.

Appendix 2: Other Outputs and Evaluation Feedback

- Nine hard copies of climate stories were collected.
- 13 feedback forms were filled out.
- Of that 13, 9 said they feel more confident to take Climate Action and 10 said that their knowledge increased to respond to the climate emergency.
